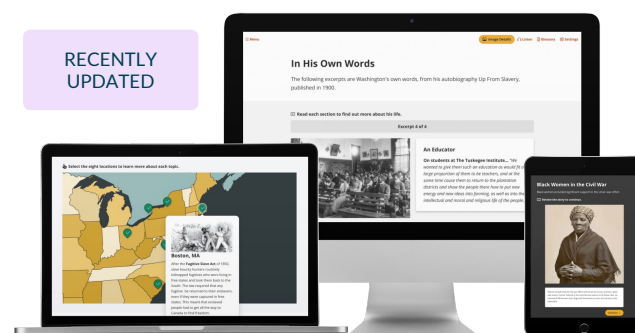

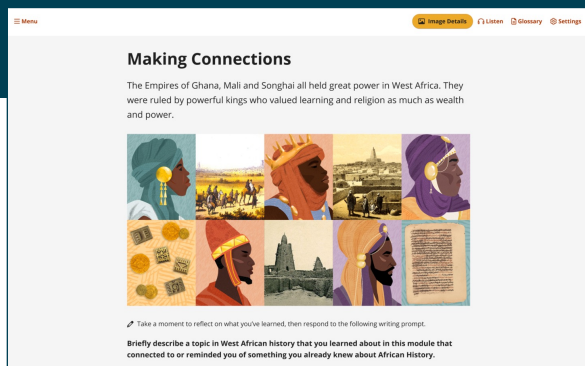

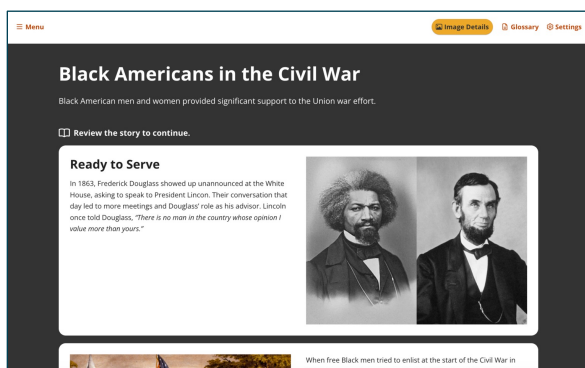
Explore the Lives and Stories of Black Americans Throughout History

Students explore the kingdoms of West Africa prior to the year 1600 CE. The structure of governments and agricultural production are also examined.

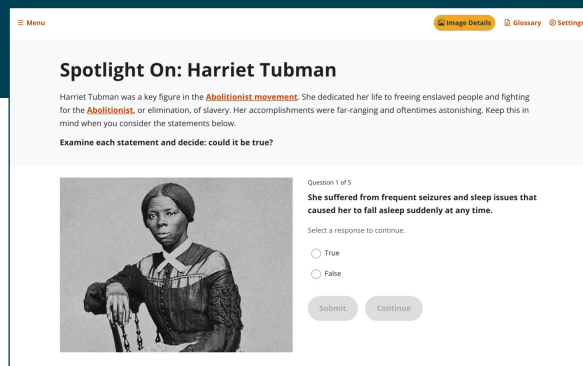


Students identify leaders who helped to pave the way for more opportunities for Black Americans in the fabric of social and political culture.



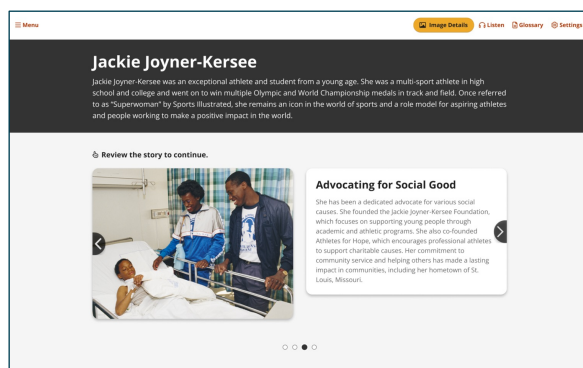
